(based on Luke 4:1-13)

## It's Tempting!

(based on Luke 4:1-13)

Use one or more activities from each section to explore grace and gratitude with your children this week.

### Recognizing God's Grace

- Read and enjoy the story with your child—imagine and wonder.
- Imagine the wilderness in the story. Ask: What makes it a wilderness? Have you been in a wilderness like that one or a different kind of wilderness? What made it a wilderness to you?
- Put bread, a paper crown, and a tall chair in the middle of a room. Invite people to stand by the symbol that they think was Jesus' hardest test. Encourage everyone to name the test that would be hardest for him or her.
- Jesus used God's teachings to help him. Help everyone pick a Bible verse as a reminder to trust God, such as Psalm 37:40a, Psalm 46:1, Romans 8:26a, Hebrews 2:18, and Hebrews 13:6. Invite people to write or draw their verses on slips of paper and to put them somewhere they will be seen often.



### Responding to God's Grace

- Put wrapped pieces of candy in a bowl on a table with a sign that says, "This treat is for later." Do not define when later will be. Let the candy sit there all week. Each day, invite people to share how it feels to leave the treat alone. Name something that is easier or harder to leave alone. At the end of the week, share the treat.
- Jesus spent 40 days alone praying, fasting, and talking to God. Try spending 4 minutes alone praying each day. Try giving up (fasting from) four treats this week.

### Celebrating in Gratitude

- At the end of each day, invite people to celebrate making good choices by completing these sentences: "I felt tested when . . ." and "God helped me by . . ." Shout, "Thank you, God!" and clap loudly after each person tells about making a good choice.
- Pray the following prayer each day this week:

*Dear God, be with me when I am tested. Help me make good choices. Amen.*
