(based on John 13:1-17)

"No one is better than anyone else," explained Jesus. "If I can serve you, then you can serve each other. Follow me and do what I do."



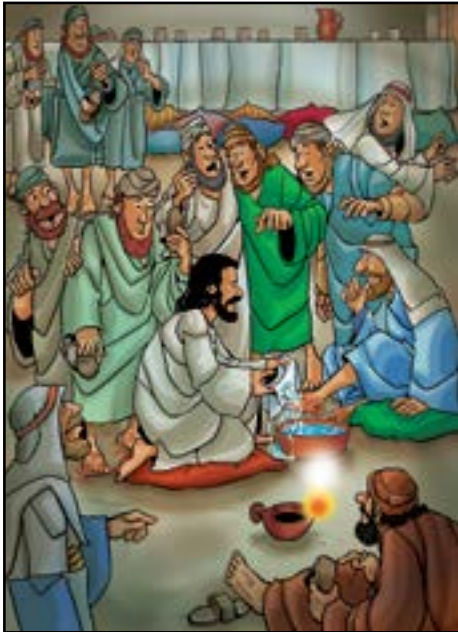
## Jesus Washes the Disciples' Feet

(based on John 13:1-17)

Use one or more activities from each section to explore grace and gratitude with your children this week.

### Recognizing God's Grace

- Read and enjoy the story with your children—imagine and wonder.
- When Jesus' friends were tired, Jesus washed their feet. What do we do for our family and friends when they are tired?
- Whose feet would you wash? Who would you allow to wash your feet?



### Responding to God's Grace

- Spread newspapers on the floor. Make footprint art by putting paint on your children's feet and pressing them onto the paper. Let that image be the basis for a picture. See what emerges through your creativity. After the project, clean up by washing feet!
- Be a servant. Let every person in the family have a turn cleaning a sink in your house.
- Choose an organization that gives shoes for those in need, and arrange to take part in their work by donating shoes or money.

### Celebrating in Gratitude

- Put on some peppy music. Give everyone an old pair of socks. Dampen the socks, and dance on the kitchen floor, cleaning as you go.
- Did you know that a foot has twenty-six bones and even more tendons and ligaments? All of these help our feet do their job. Look up other facts about feet, and wonder that God provided us with such a functional part of our bodies.
- Trace around the feet of every person in your family. Cut out the shapes and lay them out in a circle. Glue them together to make a wreath to hang on your family's door. A possible caption is, "Our family serves."
- Pray this prayer:

*Lord Jesus, you loved your disciples so much that you washed and soothed their tired feet. Help us to know your loving and soothing presence in our lives. Amen.*
