(based on John 20:1-18)

"I have seen Jesus! He is alive!"



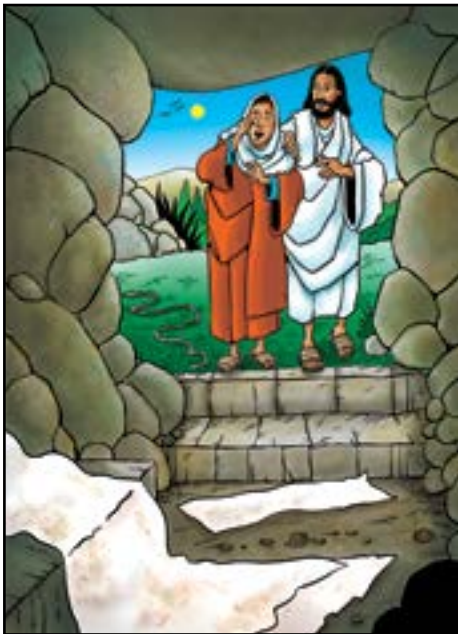
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Use one or more activities from each section to explore grace and gratitude with your children this week.
