(based on Luke 16:19–31)

Eventually, both Lazarus and the rich man died. The angels of God came and carried Lazarus up to a special place in heaven next to Abraham.

"If they won't listen to the Scriptures," replied Abraham, "then they won't listen to someone who comes back from the dead."




## The Rich Man and Lazarus

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Use one or more activities from each section to explore grace and gratitude with your children this week.

### Recognizing God's Grace

- Read and enjoy the story with your children—imagine and wonder.
- Ask your children if they think God loves rich people more than poor people. What does today's story say about that?
- Wonder how it can be that some people have so much, while others have so little.



### Responding to God's Grace

- Wonder how the rich man could ignore the needs of someone right in front of his house. What would God have us do for people who need our help?
- The rich man didn't decide to take care of Lazarus until it was too late. Talk with your children about times it can be too late. Burning dinner, missing a bus, saying something that can't be unsaid are small and big reminders that we need to make good decisions when we have the opportunity.
- In some cases, it's easy to know which is the best decision. Sometimes we don't know for a long time if we've made the best choice. Wonder with your children how to recognize a good decision.

### Celebrating in Gratitude

- A rich man wanted his family to learn about God from Lazarus. Ask your children how and where we learn about God. Does your family learn at home, at church, at camp? Where else? Celebrate learning together.
- Enjoy singing "Father Abraham," with the motions.
- Pray:

*God, we want to share your love. Show us people who seem to be invisible, who could use our care today, while there is still time to do something. Amen.*
