



## The Potter Shapes the Clay

(based on Jeremiah 18:1-6)

Jeremiah was a prophet. One day, God told him to go to the workshop where a potter was making some pots.

“When you get to the potter’s shop,” God explained, “I will give you a message for the people.”

So Jeremiah went and watched the potter make pots out of clay.

Jeremiah watched as the potter took a lump of clay and rolled it. He used his hands to squeeze the clay until it was ready to be worked. It had to be just right.

And God said, “I am like the potter.”

And Jeremiah gave thanks for God’s love.




## The Potter Shapes the Clay

(based on Jeremiah 18:1-6)

Use one or more activities from each section to explore grace and gratitude with your children this week.

### Recognizing God's Grace

- Read and enjoy the story with your children—imagine and wonder.
- Talk together about a time when things went wrong and you had to start over. Invite them to share about a time like that also.
- Talk together about things that can change shape. Discuss how some changes are temporary, and some are part of a long process of growing.



### Responding to God's Grace

- Sing “Spirit of the Living God,” *Glory to God* 388, or sing along with the YouTube video “Spirit of the Living God” ([bit.ly/SpiritOfTheLivingGod](https://bit.ly/SpiritOfTheLivingGod)).
- Visit a pottery studio to see a real potter in action, and to see handmade pottery items.
- Make foil sculptures. Use a length of aluminum foil to make a person in your family or someone you all know. Guess who it is. Take turns reshaping the foil into another person and guessing.

### Celebrating in Gratitude

- Make rolled sugar cookies using cookie dough from scratch or purchased in the refrigerator case at the grocery store. Use cookie cutters. Remember that we are all being shaped by God.
- Make homemade play dough. See [bit.ly/UlimatePlayDough](https://bit.ly/UlimatePlayDough) for a recipe. Make play dough together and enjoy shaping and reshaping the dough.
- Pray:

*God, you are the potter. I am the clay. Shape me into the person you want me to be. Amen.*
