(based on Luke 1:37, 39-40, 46-55)

Nothing Is Impossible

(based on Luke 1:37, 39-40, 46-55)

Use one or more activities from each section to explore grace and gratitude with your children this week.

Recognizing God's Grace

- Read the Bible story, and light three purple candles on your Advent wreath.
- Wonder together what seems to be impossible. Then wonder together what possibilities God has for each of you. Remember that with God all things are possible!
- Find stories in the Bible that seemed impossible, such as the sea parting so the Israelites could pass, manna in the wilderness, water from a rock, feeding five thousand people, the raising of Lazarus, and the raising of Jesus! Wonder what other stories from the Bible, history, or in the world today seemed impossible but were possible.



Responding to God's Grace

- Practice seeing new possibilities by playing a game. Choose three or four common objects in your house, such as a fork, a bag, a colander or strainer, and a sock. Have everyone take turns suggesting a different way to use each object. Name as many new possibilities for each object as you can.
- Have everyone make a snowflake out of a sheet of white paper. Then invite each person to write a prayer request or difficult situation they are facing on their snowflake. Pray together that God would be with you in these times. Toss the snowflakes in the air and let them float to the ground. Tie a string around each one and hang it in your home, perhaps on a Christmas tree, to remind you that God is always with you.
- Make a banner for your home, saying "All things are possible with God!"

Celebrating in Gratitude

- Pray this prayer each day this week.
