Speak, Lord, Your Servant Is Listening 1 Samuel 3:1–20

God Is Still Speaking

So Samuel told him everything and hid nothing from him. Then [Eli] said, "It is the LORD; let him do what seems good to him."

1 Samuel 3:18

Samuel's first prophetic message from God is not good news for Eli. Prophetic oracles of the biblical text are rarely easy to hear. They are often warnings of impending judgments or rebukes of injustices and immorality. But Eli's response to his own condemnation is admirable. He doesn't get angry at Samuel for relaying the word of God. He submits to the truth and accepts what it means for him and his household. Even when cursed, Eli knows how to hear the word of God.

Eli and Samuel invite us to reflect on the prophets in our culture as a spiritual practice. Who are the prophetic voices in our society? What is our response to their messages? What does it mean to listen to God's voice for us today?

Lord, help me to discern and hear the voices of your modern prophets. Amen.

Listening to God 1 Samuel 8:4–20

God Knows Best

But the people refused to listen.

1 Samuel 8:19a

God, through Samuel, warned the Israelites that having a king would lead to suffering. Nonetheless, the people demanded a king. While God was clear about what this would mean for the Israelites, God chose to give them what they wanted. That choice was both a warning and a gift.

The warning might be, "Be careful what you wish for." God might not prevent us from making bad choices. Therefore, we must listen. We must pray, study, and strive to discern what God knows is best for us.

The gift is that God is not an overbearing parent who controls our lives despite our wishes. God wants genuine relationships with us, so God considers our hopes and desires. Then, when we find that what we wanted was not in our best interest, God is still with us to hold us, help us stand again, and encourage us to make better choices the next time.

Listening to God Psalm 138

God Hears Us

On the day I called, you answered me; you increased my strength of soul.

Psalm 138:3

God hears and answers our prayers. Still, sometimes the answer is no, which can be painful to hear.

When my family was in crisis, our daily prayer of "take this from us" was repeatedly answered with "No. You will have to walk through this." While we did not like that answer, being heard provided great comfort. God was the one we could talk to with complete openness and honesty. God was always there to listen.

Being heard also helped us clear our thoughts so that we could hear both God and others better, making it easier to discern how to move forward.

Finally, being heard, as the psalmist says, increases our strength of soul. When we consistently felt the love of God present to hear and answer, we were strengthened for the journey, even when the answer to our prayers was no.

Loving God, thank you for hearing and answering our prayers. Amen.

Listening to God Genesis 3:8–15

God's Invitation to Relationship

But the LORD God called to the man and said to him, "Where are you?"

Genesis 3:9

Why did God ask the man, "Where are you?" Even when I know the answers, I still ask my children to tell me about their day. When I know they have done something wrong, I still ask them to tell me, in their own words, what it was and why.

God wants to engage with us. God's question is an invitation to conversation, an invitation to relationship.

"Where are you?" is more than a question of location. Where are you, Adam, in your thinking? Where are you in your feelings? Where are you in your decision to hide? While God may already know the answers to these questions, the questions themselves help Adam understand himself better too. Sometimes it is the questions that help us to know ourselves best. This knowledge helps us grow in our connections to ourselves, others, and God.

Gracious God, thank you for inviting us into relationship with you. Amen.

Listening to God Psalm 130

Waiting for the Lord

I wait for the LORD; my soul waits, and in his word I hope.

Psalm 130:5

Generally, we don't wait well. We download movies and books, message instantly, and obtain food from drive-throughs.

Yet waiting brings gifts. We learn to hope. We learn to listen more fully as we wait for God to come to us anew. We are challenged by the call to wait, to stop worrying, and to just be. Waiting asks us to take time to be still, to savor moments in which there is nothing else to do. Waiting invites us to ignore our phones and computers and our to-do lists. "Be still, and know that I am God!" (46:10).

If we never take the time to be still, to wait, how will we know God? God's time is not our time, and God will not cater to our desires for instant gratification.

Meet God in the waiting. God waits for you.

Help my soul to wait for you and to hope in your word.

LISTENING TO GOD PSALM 130

Listening versus Talking

Out of the depths I cry to you, O LORD.

Psalm 130:1

There are times of struggle when all we can do is cry out to God. We cry from the depths of our soul, praying for God to save us from despair. We trust that God hears us and answers. But often, we do more talking than listening for God's answers.

In my congregation, we have added moments of silence to our prayers so that after the speaking, we have space to listen for God. Still, these moments of corporate silence are uncomfortable for many and are often shortened. Do we cut silence out of our personal prayer time as well? Do we become impatient in the quiet, wondering if we are wasting our time? Do we desire to keep talking as thoughts arise rather than listening?

God invites our prayers and wants to hear what we have to say. But in our relationship with God, we need to listen too.

Listening to God Mark 3:20–35

The Uncontrollable God

If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand.

Mark 3:24

Jesus healed, cast out demons, and taught. In response, his family declared him crazy. The legal experts said he was possessed by Beelzebul. But, as Jesus said, Satan can't cast out Satan. Still, the people were afraid. They assigned explanations and cast judgments to make sense of and control what they could not understand.

In *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe,* C. S. Lewis's Jesus character is Aslan, the lion. Asked if Aslan was safe, Mr. Beaver responded, "'Course he isn't safe. But he's good."* Jesus, too, was not safe, but he was good. His work to cast out demons should have demonstrated that. When God acts in ways we don't expect, we are invited to name what we don't understand and strive to trust in God's goodness rather than trying to control God with labels or explanations.

Rest in God's unending grace.
