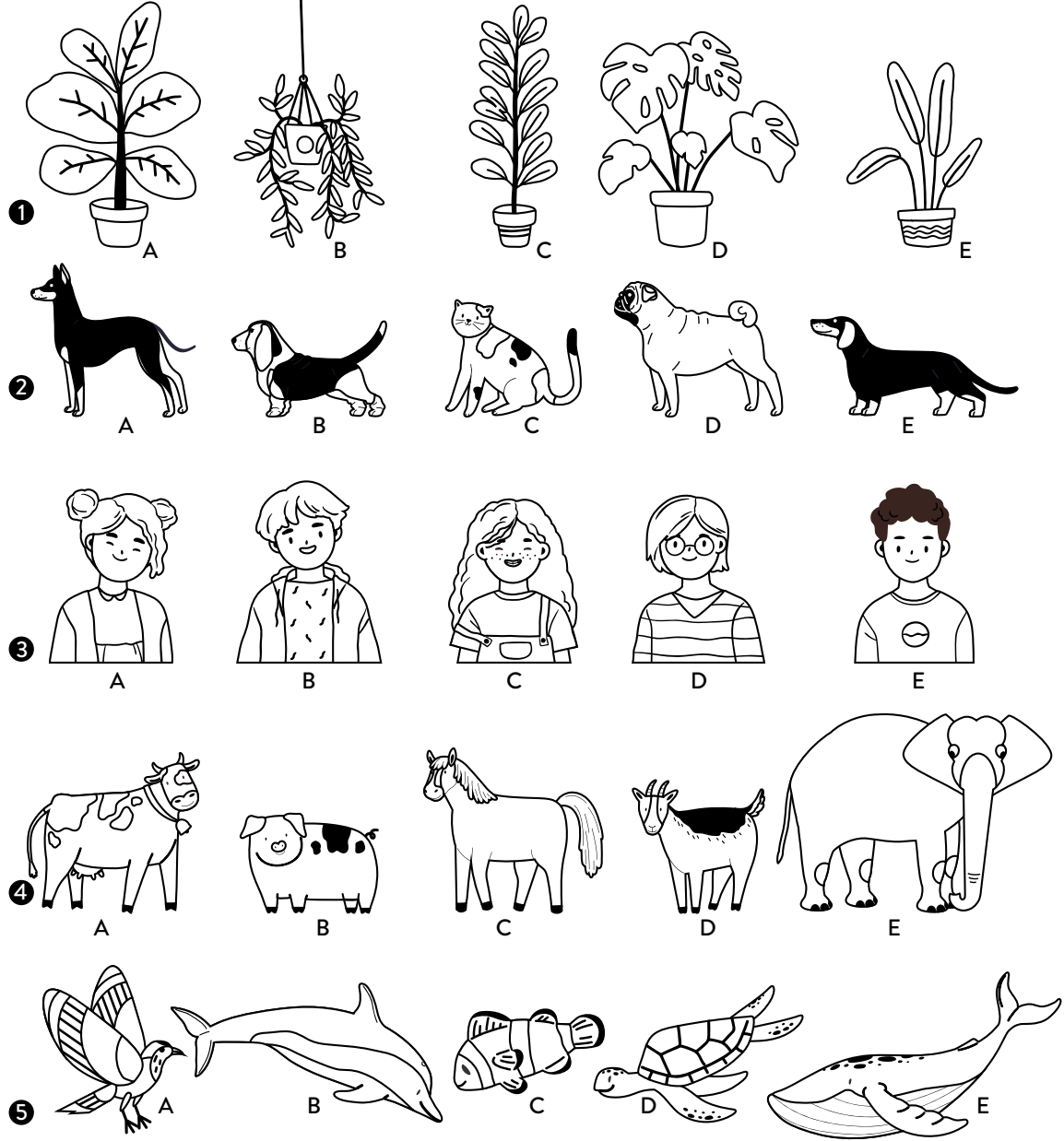
WAYS TO PRACTICE AT HOME

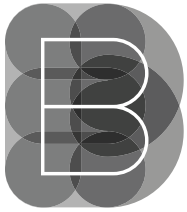

- Make a list of differences and similarities in your family. Take turns having a family member choose one difference and one similarity to celebrate each day. It might be a favorite food or game to play. It could be that everyone loves the color green and the day is spent celebrating green things! Be creative.
- Read *Whoever You Are* by Mem Fox (Clarion Books, 2006) or watch the YouTube video "Read-Aloud of Whoever You Are by Mem Fox" (bit.ly/FMWhoeverYouAre, 3:07). Talk together about the things that may be different and the things that are the same about people and wonder why differences and similarities are each important in our world.

BIBLE STORY

Based on Genesis 1:1–27

At the beginning of time, God created the world. Before God created the world, there was nothing but darkness, and a wind from God swirled around. In this darkness and wind, God decided that there should be not just darkness, but also light. At first it was just dark, dark and bright light, but then the dark began to soften and there were shadows and dusk and twilight. The bright light had shades like white and yellow and pink and was dawn and noontime. God liked the dark and the light and everything in between. It was all good.

God separated waters and sky, and then the waters from the waters, and dry land appeared. At first it was just lots of sky, but then there were clouds, sometimes long and thin, and other times fluffy and round. The waters became seas and oceans, rivers and streams, and raindrops and puddles. The dry land became tall mountains and flat plains, hot deserts, and cold tundra. The waters and the lands mixed and were estuaries and bayous and swamps.

God liked it all, the waters and sky and lands and everything in between. It was all good.

God said that things should grow on the lands and in the waters, and then there were jungles and wheatfields, seaweed and moss. God liked all the growing things, the tiny seeds and the giant trees and everything in between. It was all good.
