

1 Recognize Injustice

WAYS TO PRACTICE AT HOME

To do justice we need to recognize the injustice that surrounds us in the world, as well as our participation in it. While it is not our intention to harm others, injustice is found in systems that create advantages, often for those who are already privileged, and keep others in places of oppression and harm. When we see and hear hurtful actions and realize we may be involved in them, knowingly and unknowingly, work can be done to correct them.

- Create a chart of injustices and changes. Fold a sheet of paper in half and title one side "Things that Don't Seem Right" and the other side "Making Changes." As you pay attention to what happens around you during the week, put a frown ☺ when you see or hear injustice or unfairness happening. On the other side, draw a happy face ☺ for each time someone helps change things to make the situation better.
- Listen to "Free to Be... You and Me—Sara Bareilles" (bit.ly /FMFreeToBe, 3:54), a song about possibilities for fairness for all. The song and images speak to the potential for every child. What pictures would you want to add to this video?
- On a sheet of paper, trace both of your hands. In one hand, write or draw a picture of an injustice or unfairness you see or hear. In the other hand, write or draw a way you might try to make a change to the situation in the first hand. Talk together about ways to make changes.

Dear God, help me pay attention to situations that are unjust or unfair and find ways to change them for the better. Amen.

Follow Me—Do Justice
